Forklift Safety Equipment - There are various industries and operations, for instance agricultural, manufacturing and warehousing which use powered industrial trucks together with lift trucks or forklift trucks frequently within the workplace. Lift trucks are utilized in order to lower or raise objects or transfer stuff that are stored on pallets or in containers to other locations inside the workplace. These industrial machinery aid to enhance productivity at the job location by reducing the requirement for excessive manual handling of stuff by workers. According to the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, there are something like twenty thousand serious injuries each year in the US and about 100 fatalities because of the result of lift truck incidents.

Each and every different lift truck or forklift consists of different load capacities. Where a load is concerned, every unit would differ for particular maximum weight and forward center gravity. Injuries for staff usually occur from collision with pedestrians, falls from the forklift, forklift overturn or crushing incidents. Operator falls can take place as the employee descends or ascends into the driver cab or becomes ejected from the machinery in the event of a collision or an accident. Lift trucks could overturn due to being overloaded, or having an unequal center of gravity of the cargo or traveling over an uneven surface that can cause the vehicle to topple over. It is vital for other co-workers to observe strict safety measures whenever working near the forklift. Without adequate preventive measures, pedestrian co-workers are at risk from collisions or accidents connected with an unsafe cargo.

There are strict standards and training to be following with regards to forklift operation, training and maintenance. An instance, individuals in non-agricultural trades below the age of 18 years are not permitted to operate a lift truck. It is required that all lift truck operators should have undergone both theoretical and practical training prior to commencing forklift operation and they are likewise needed to take refresher courses.

The "American National Standard for Powered Industrial Trucks, ANSI B56.1-1969 are the standards which all powered industrial trucks should comply with. The particular OSHA standards that employees as well as employers must adhere to as stated in the General Industry Standards include 1910.178 "Powered industrial trucks", and standards for Marine Terminals 29 CFR 1917 Subpart C, "Cargo handling gear and equipment" and Long shoring 29 CFR 1918 Subpart G, "Cargo handling gear and equipment other than ship's gear.

There are different other directives and regulations which are vital for employers to know. The NIOSH and OSHA both comprehensively outline regulations or signpost employers and employees to all regulations that apply.
